UNIFORM CHANGES

The Board of Trustees after extensive consultation has affirmed some changes to the School Uniform Code for 2015. The major changes include:

1. White Polo shirts for girls
2. White business shirts for boys
3. Year 13 students are able to wear jandals in Terms 1 and 4.

To support the introduction of these changes, we will be revisiting our expectations on the school uniform. In particular from Monday 10th November we will be helping Year 9 and 10 students to raise their standard of dress. We want students to demonstrate respect in our school and wear their uniform with pride. To assist students with this, we will be requiring them to wear only the prescribed uniform.

To support the new Board expectations, we will be confiscating inappropriate clothing. These are such things as caps in class, non-regulation sweatshirts, coloured singlets or T shirts. This also includes the non-regulation jackets or the inappropriate hoodies wrapped around students' waists. To help remind students about this, Tutor Teachers have been sharing with students these expectations.

Teachers will bag and label the confiscated items and they will be given to Student Services who will look after them. These items will remain at Student Services until the end of term, or until parents or whanau come in and pick them up.

Not to comply with this reasonable request to hand over the item will require a conversation with a member of the SLT and could involve discipline up to and including stand downs.

We are also asking parents and our extended community to donate any old school uniforms which you no longer require. We intend to build up a bank of uniforms to share with students in need. Items in need are polo tops, black shoes, and sandals and other items of clothing and would be greatly appreciated. These can be left at Student Services

I thank you in advance for your support of this refocus on school uniform. The fully amended Uniform Code is as follows.



Melville High School

UNIFORM CODE

This uniform is **COMPULSORY** for Years 9, 10, 11 and 12 students at Melville High School.

All Year 13 students are able to wear mufti in accordance with the Senior Dress Code.

All Melville High School **regulation** uniform items, except shoes, are available for purchase from the Student Services Centre during school hours. Students are only permitted to wear clothing outlined in this uniform code.

GIRLS UNIFORM

BLOUSE: **Regulation** white cotton button through blouse
or
Regulation white cotton polo
SKIRT: **Regulation** black
SHORTS: **Regulation** black
SOCKS: Plain black
STOCKINGS: Winter: Plain black pantyhose

BOYS UNIFORM

SHIRT: **Regulation** white cotton polo or **White** Business Shirt
SHORTS: **Regulation** black
TROUSERS: **Regulation** long black
SOCKS: Plain black

*No socks/stockings to be worn with sandals. Jeans are forbidden.
Year 13 students **only** may wear jandals in Terms 1 and 4.*

BOYS and GIRLS UNIFORM

JERSEY

Regulation

PE Uniform Dress Code

JACKET

Regulation black or
MHS 4 colour panel
jacket

Regulation green top and red shorts

SHOES

Regulation plain black. No other coloured markings. Lace up shoes must have black laces.
Black sandals only, must have back heel strap. No jandals/boots.

SKIVVY / TOP

A plain white long sleeved top/skivvy only may be worn under regulation polo top or blouse.

JEWELLERY

Wristwatch, plain ear studs/sleepers in ears only. No other jewellery.
Special taonga/cross must not be visible. No visible piercings.
No bracelets.

HAIR

Male students must be clean shaven. Hair should be clean and tidy. No extreme hairstyle/colour – Principal's discretion. Hair accessories to be plain school colours.

CAPS

Plain black cap only. These must be removed inside. No beanies.

SCARVES

Plain white, green or black. Multi-coloured scarves are **not** allowed.

MAKE-UP:

Students may only wear a minimal amount of make-up to school.

SAFETY:

Certain classroom environments have Health and safety requirements including Covered footwear which students need to comply with before they can participate in the classroom activities.

The wearing of the correct uniform is the responsibility of students and parents/caregivers. Non regulation items may be confiscated and stored at the Student Services to be uplifted by parents/caregivers. Non-compliance to requests to hand over such items will require students to have a conversation with a member of the SLT and may involve discipline steps up to and including a stand-down.



JOSHUA SHOOTING HIGH

It was a good weekend in Christchurch for Josh Pratt from September 27th - 29th 2014.

Josh shot 3 events in the South Island DTL on Saturday with good scores (17/20, 58/60, 8/10), but didn't make a final. On Sunday he shot the NZ DTL competition with about 300 others and ended up with a possible (25/25) in the Single Rise along with 35 others. He was eliminated in the final without placing. He did well in the Points event with a 69/75 and not so good in the Single Barrel (11/15). He was disappointed with his results but actually did very well.



On Monday morning was the South Island Skeet competition and in tricky conditions Josh shot a 21/25. No possibles were shot which is unusual - top was a 23 so he was close to the top - finishing 9th.

On Monday afternoon was the NZ Skeet Competition which he shot 22/25. One possible was shot (25/25) and Josh was in a shoot off for 2nd with 5 others. He lasted a couple of stands to finish a creditable 4th. He was then selected to shoot in the 3 man North Island Team against the South Island. The South Island team consisted of first from South Island Skeet, first from NZ Skeet and one of the others Josh shot against for 2nd in NZ Skeet. He was shooting with 2 boys from Palmerston North as they were the top 3 finishers from the North Island schools and their team won - with Josh shooting the top score of 24. It would have been enough to win him the South Islands and 2nd in the NZ if he had shot it earlier in the day!

PENITA DAVIES GUEST SPEAKER AT PRIZEGIVING

Penita is a mother of six. She has been training in Kyokushin Karate for 19 years and holds a 4th Degree Black Belt (Yondan). Working alongside Shihan Davies, Penita is the hub of Davies Karate Super Family Centre; she is what makes the whole school function as a welcoming personality and on a relentless mission to serve the whole family centre. Penita helps retain and enhance the family centre's growing reputation throughout Waikato and the world.



Even though Penita has a warm and vibrant personality, she is definitely not one to be taken advantage of, especially in the full-contact arena. Being New Zealand's first female to win not only one but, 'back to back' World Kyokushin Karate titles. Penita has a grand reputation in NZ as the most decorated and undefeated female Karate exponent and is well known and respected throughout the World.



After retiring from World Kyokushin knockdown tournaments in 2008 Penita set a new goal... This 'Goal' was to impart her knowledge and skills to teach the next generation of young fighters to compete on the world stage. At the end of 2009, Penita was appointed as the National Kyokushin Coach for Team NZ whom would compete at the 3rd World Cup in Estepona, Spain in June 2010. In 2010 Penita exceeded her goal by coaching her very own student to achieve a World title, winning the 'Women's Heavyweight Division'.

Since then Penita was appointed NZ coach & lead the NZ Team to Japan – in 2012 for the 5th World Tournament. 2013, Penita & Shihan welcomed their 6th child ~ Aryah Davies...

Penita's motto is simple: "If it is to be, it's up to me!"
