These students were among 37 recipients selected from 60 nominations and will receive \$5000 towards their first year of study at the University of Waikato or Wintech.

The scholarships have been made possible by the David Johnstone Charitable Trust, founded by David Johnstone, a well-known farming identity in the Waikato. His aim was to assist young people to further their education, and Guardian Trust has proudly managed the Trust for 28 years.

Next year, Ariane will be studying a Bachelor of Science and Nicola, a Bachelor of Teaching, both at the University of Waikato, and Louise will study at WinTec.

The display of senior art portfolios in the staffroom after prizegiving was particularly impressive and my appreciation goes out to Lester Silver and Rachel Kiddie for their support of students to attain such high standards and for facilitating the display. Congratulations are extended to the students for their magnificent art work. Well done.

Our senior **Academic Prizegiving** is on **Thursday next week** and I hope you will all join us as we acknowledge the successes of our senior students. It is a chance to celebrate the numerous positive achievements of students, many of whom have been with us for five years.

While many of us may have been relaxing over the October holiday break, our Boys' and Girls' Basketball teams were in Nelson at the New Zealand Nationals. The girls finished runners up in the 'A' final which was an excellent outcome for their first visit to the nationals. The boys came a very creditable 13th out of 24 teams, one place behind St John's and two places behind Fraser. The boys were eligible, because our roll was below 600, to participate in the 'A' grade. However, they chose to compete in the Premier grade. This put them up against schools like Westlake Boys' which has eight times the number of boys as Melville High and a total of 32 basketball teams. This highlights their achievement. A big thank you is extended to all those who supported our students to achieve.

Finally, we have a number of gatherings and formal occasions ahead and I encourage you all to put some time aside to support students and celebrate their successes. LITERACY AND NUMERACY CALLBACK

Several parents of senior students have been informed that their children are required to attend school after the Senior Prizegiving to ensure they have further opportunities to gain the prescribed Literacy and Numeracy credits. As you may be aware there are a minimum number of literacy (reading, writing, speaking) and numeracy credits that students must have achieved before they can get NCEA Level 1 regardless of the number of credits they have achieved.

I am requiring students who have yet to gain their 10 Literacy and 10 Numeracy credits to attend school from 12 November to work with teaching staff until they have completed these credits. While school does not officially end until 10 December we hope that up to an additional week's focused effort will make a significant difference for these students.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Mr McNulty and Donna Wilson who have been working with students to support this strategy.

I thank families for their support in this matter. A letter informing families of this situation was sent out last week. If you have any queries regarding this matter please don't hesitate to contact me.

OUTDOOR PURSUITS CENTRE REPORT

On Friday 12 October, Miss Hill, Mr Schofield and 20 Year 12 students arrived at school ready for an adventure. We made a four hour trip to the Sir Edmund Hillary Outdoor Pursuit Centre in the Tongariro National Park.

The main goal of the camp was to gain knowledge and experience in using our leadership skills by doing adventure based learning. Every day for every activity one person was our designated leader so their performance could be assessed. Everyone stepped up to the plate and delivered awesome leadership skills.



Some of the activities we took part in included:

- The Human Swing (you rock climb up to a 14 metre high platform then walk off and fall)
- Swamp crossing (a group of 10 had three planks of wood to get over a series of different sized poles to get to the other side)
- Abseiling (you walk up a muddy track to a 30 metre ledge, strap on a harness and simply walk backwards until you are sitting in thin air)
- Caving (students enter underground caves led only by their flashlights and instinct. This activity forced students to work together as a team and rely on each other to ensure each person was safe and calm.)
- Mt Pukekaikiore Hike (we were given a map to show us where we were and where we needed to go. It took us over four hours to climb 1300 feet. When we reached the summit, we huddled under our Z-sack, and had our lunch and hot raro. On the trek down there were no man-made tracks so we were all forced to slide/fall down the side of the mountain. We all got muddy and wet, with some even performing forward flips on the way down)

None of this would have been possible without the immense effort from Miss Hill for all the letters she sent, and the organising and fundraising she did. Mr Schofield also gave up his weekend and became an incredible mentor to all of us students. Both deserve so much more than a thank you, but that is all we can give.

This camp forced 20 classmates, who although shared a class together and never really bonded as friends, to live together and become somewhat of a family. We all grew as individuals but flourished as a team. And because of that we all have formed tight bonds which will outlast the OPC adventure and last a life time.



All and all everyone has grown, and challenged themselves to overcome their fears. OPC is a camp that we all will never forget and are very thankful to have had the chance to experience it.

Touch

We have junior teams entered in the first ever Secondary Schools Super Touch Competition. The two Melville teams play against school teams from all over the region, during the week, after school. The boys managed to win their first game against Matamata at Matamata 8-5.

Rugby

As mentioned in our last newsletter, we had 16 boys from our rugby programme selected to play for either Harlequins or Waikato age grade teams. **Tipene, Atu, Brigham, John Boi and Piahana** were selected for the Harlequins Under 17 team. This team played the New Zealand Area Schools team at Waikato Stadium as the curtain raiser to the Waikato v Tasman ITM Cup game. Tipene managed to score two tries and kicked three conversions in a convincing win to the Harlequins 38-5. For most of the second half, all five Melville boys were on the field, cheered on by a large contingent of Melville supporters.

Mikaera was selected for New Zealand Harlequins Under 14 team and was then selected for the Waikato Under 14 team that competed in the Chiefs area Under 14 competition.

Futsal

The Melville Boys' Futsal team competed in the secondary school league in Term 3. While half the team are juniors, they competed in the senior boys' division. The team finished third on points from the round robin competition. In the play off for third and fourth, Melville beat the team from St Paul's Collegiate 5-4. The St Paul's team had won the League in Term 2. The team has shown a lot of development and will be very competitive when the secondary school League commences next year.

Football

As part of a long term development strategy, the Melville Association Football Club has introduced the "Melville School of Football". This caters for boys from 14 to 17 with the aim of having Club sides playing in the Waikato Bay of Plenty competition next year.

Five students from Melville High School were included in the first programme, **Jordan, Raukawa, Dara, Sok and Luke**. The head coach of the school is Ray MacIntosh who is a former professional player and holder of an International Coaching Certificate.

FIRST FOUNDATION

This partnership begins at secondary school, with the scholarships awarded at the end of Year 12 ensuring scholars get the support they require in their crucial final year at school to gain the qualifications needed for acceptance into tertiary study. For the next four years, our Scholarship Partners provide paid, part-time work experience for their Scholars. As part of our "hand-up, not a hand-out" philosophy, each Scholar is expected to save \$1,200 a year from their savings. These monies are paid into a Tertiary Trust Account, held by First Foundation. Each year, the Scholarship Partner contributes a set amount to help meet the student's tertiary fees and to fund First Foundation's support and development programmes (\$2000 in year one, then \$6000 in years two, three and four). Scholars are supported by Mentors, and their progress is monitored by First Foundation.

All of the partners to the Scholarship meet annually for a formal review to celebrate achievements, set new goals, and identify areas for improvement.

This year we are pleased to announce that two Year 12 students, **Cian** and **Morgan** have been awarded this scholarship.

A great night of celebration was held at this year's Sports and Cultural Prizegiving. Dave Rennie was this year's guest speaker. He is the current coach of the Chiefs Rugby team which was this year's Super Rugby champion beating the top teams from New Zealand, Australia and South Africa.

As a former representative player for Wellington, Mr Rennie began his coaching while he was a teacher. He coached 1st XV rugby and numerous other grades. He first came to national prominence while coaching the Manawatu Turbos which are based in Palmerston North (they have the green bucket heads supporters). He has impressive credentials as a rugby coach, coaching the NZ Under 20 side to three consecutive victories from 2008-2010 in the Junior World Rugby Championships. Mr Rennie talked about the strategies he used to strengthen the connection between the Chiefs and the region that they represent. He also commented on the need to have strong relationships and that within teams you need strong and confident leaders. He also shared with students that team members need to work hard and consistently demonstrate a positive work ethic. He said those players need to apply themselves for the full 80 minutes.

We were also privileged to have the Ranfurly Shield on display at the prizegiving. The shield is an iconic symbol of provincial rugby in New Zealand, and students and adults alike welcomed the opportunity to view the shield and to have their photo taken with it.

Compere, Russell Wilson managed the evening well. A host of teaching and support staff worked hard behind the scenes. It was truly a collective effort to honour the successes of our students. The evening culminated in a light supper and the opportunity to view a magnificent of visual art boards of senior students in the staff room

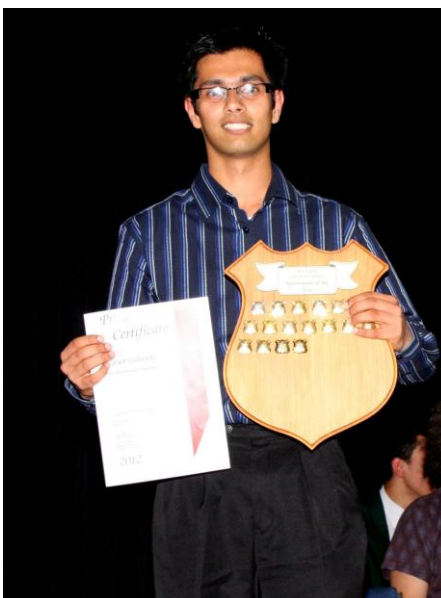
